We survived two World Wars, and the Club Gazette, which appeared every couple of months, was an important way of keeping the Club together, sent around the World to those in the forces and those in Prisoner of War camps.

To reach the end of our 150 year celebrations and find our activities similarly challenged has taken us all by surprise but the spirit that has kept us together in the past will no doubt shine through again and sustain us until a return to normality. However, I don't think we will be sending boxes of fags to those who are self isolating.

In the wake of the arrival of the coronavirus all Athletics events are off until the end of May at least, the YDL and English Schools are cancelled. The new National Athletics League for Seniors has cancelled the first round of matches and postponed the second round with the hope of it taking place in September. The problem the Sport has is that it is so dependent on people over the age of 70 who are supposed to stay indoors for three months and that was from the 22nd of March. European Athletics probably picked the right year not to organise the European Champions Club Cup for Juniors. On top of that Athletics Weekly is not publishing for the time being.

Vice President Roy Smith has now recovered from the virus but was quite unwell for a couple of days. Stan Ridgewell and wife Liz have had an extended cruise and have just returned home safely. Perhaps they will be able to give a talk at the Clubhouse on their experiences when we have the all clear.

But it is not all doom and gloom, the Eurovision Song Contest has met its Waterloo and been cancelled.

More importantly, although the Clubhouse is shut, our new President Nic Corry is giving a weekly news update on the Club's Facebook page at 8pm each Wednesday. Over a hundred attended online last Wednesday (1st of April). It is a wonderful way of bringing members together from across the globe.



50 years ago in March 1970

Tony Wadhams finishes 11th in the triple jump at the European Indoor Championships in Vienna with a distance of 51' 5". The Senior Men finish in 9th place in the National Cross Championships in Blackpool. They are the third Southern team to finish. Bob Richardson is first home in 32nd.


Bob Richardson also wins the Tonbridge 10 in 48.35 with Bob Hawtin 5th in 50.33 and Ian Wilson 7th in 50.48. Blackheath win the team race.

Over the month the Club also contest the Crawley Road Relay, the Cambridge Harriers Road Relay, and the TVH Relay. The Winter track meeting is moved from Ladywell to Crystal Palace and attracts over 400 competitors from across the South of England and Midlands. There are 19 heats of the 60 metres, which take 70 minutes to complete. "At 6.30pm the timekeepers pressed their watches on the 55th track race of the afternoon to conclude the proceedings on our most successful Winter Track Meeting to date"

"With the introduction of metres for all athletic events, all distances shown in the Gazette for both track and field events will be given in metres unless otherwise stated. For approximate conversion one metre can be taken as 3' 3 ½"."

25 years ago in March 1995.

The Senior Men retain the National Cross Country title in style at Wigmore Valley Park, Luton. Their winning score of 120 is the lowest winning points score in the race since 1946 when only 239 runners took part. Runners up Bingley's points score of 159 would have won all but two of the previous 30 championships. Not since 1961 have two teams scored under 200 points on the same day, when there were 796 competitors. In 1995 over 2000 runners started the race.

You know what they say about the buses. You can wait 124 years and then suddenly you win the National twice.

11th Mar 1995

This one went to script from almost a year ago. Helped in no small way by the high position of Morpeth's sixth scorer. Going back this season the team is strenthened by the Fitness of Phil Hogston and the addition of Simon Baines. Watling may have seemed a little presumptious to the remaining (sadly) athletics journal but eventually confidence did not become an embarassment. From the gun it was noticeable even to Dave Denton on the mike that the boys in black were out for glory. '... and Blackheath have four in twelve!' he intoned as the field passed the first bend. So they did as the multicoloured cavalcade went past the first bank of mobile Heathen ranks. Dave Taylor, Spencer Newport, Tim Dickinson and Phil Hogston led the black tide, all placed well to the fore. Out into the back of the beginning of the lap out of sight as the mobile supporters moved to their next vantage point and Denton's voice was heard to warble 'David Taylor from Lewis, Duval and Nuttall!!' The cheers rose again and sure enough it was true. The cheers rose again and the familiar cry of 'Blackh-e-a-t-h!' rose above the rest of the mundane cheers.

Taylor's recent road form had made him a real powerhouse in this team, Newport and Dickinson had shown confident form all season and a worry about Hogston starting too fast did occur. Not far back were Simon Baines, Darrell Smith and Steve Dodd. Things had got off to the best possible start. Those who check through the field to tab the progress of the rivals could see that Morpeth had already been dealt with and only Bingley were possible rivals. But we were outpointing them despite the fact that Anderson led our team and Moore was also ahead of us. From there back we were making the positive moves.

On the second lap Duval, Lewis, Robinson and Nuttall led a bit of a breakaway while the likes of Bannister and Tromans also headed our challenge. But in close order we had Taylor, Newport and Dickinson well placed with Hogston holding on in the twenties and Baines and Smith still strong. Steve Dodd, fourth scorer last year was moving through strongly and likely to step into the breach should one of the others falter.

The final lap saw some dramatic changes, but all were for the benefit of Blackheath. Firstly Dave Lewis threw in the towel. Duval broke away and some of the leaders began to feel it and dropped back. This splitting of the field coincided with Taylor and Dickinson getting together in a battle for the Heathen supremacy, their battle took them both up a few places. Steve Dodd surged through the field and became our fourth scorer again.

Spencer Duval won quite convincingly but David Taylor was the runner to catch the Blackheath eye as he won his battle with Dickinson and in the finishing straight he rubbed salt in the wound as he stormed past Bingley's leader Anderson and finished a magnificent 6th. Not too far in arrears was Tim Dickinson in a great ninth place in his first National at the age of 21. He has had a wonderful season to date and this must have been a hell of a prediction a year ago. Spencer Newport finishing 11th for our third man was also a great performance. Eighth a year ago, on what was more his course, he has shown in just a few races that he really is a man for all surfaces. Steve Dodd's act was a touch of Guilder at his best. Moving through all the way he finished 27th for our fourth. Phil Hogston, also in his first National at 21, did not live out our fears and placed 28th to live out his dreams. Simon Baines was a bit disappointed by his 37th but he did make a valuable contribution to a historic winning team with the best team score since 1946. There were less than 300 runners on that day!

Those who shouted themselves hoarse for the cause were justly credited by the team and justly rewarded for their efforts. It was a great performance and a great day for the Club,

That day had started, for some, hours earlier with the National Championships in the younger age groups. In the first race of the day Gemma Viney placed 12th in the Under-13 girls event. Off the leaders from the start she ran a race which saw her progress through the field in that fluent style of hers to eventually finish 16 seconds down on the bronze medal. With another year in the Age group to look forward to, next year could prove even more interesting. The team, 40th last year, moved up to 19th and even provoked another intone from Denton on mike. Even if our leader again had her name mispronounced.

Mark Steinle has suffered that fate on times too numerous to recall. But having been around so long even Denton has got it right now. Mark was sixth in a very strong field and was gaining on the leaders on the final lap. His preference seems now to be for the flatter courses and he will relish a return to Newark next year as a member of the Senior Team. Chris Wada had his best run of the season in 33rd. Another fine placing was recorded by Chris Moss to place 13th in the U17 Championship. He also returns to the same race next year and could be the sort of runner to be at home at Newark.

Another fine evening at the clubhouse followed. A fine mix of runners, with almost the entire Senior team and many avid supporters of the cause. Dave Taylor enlivened the evening in drag and George Gandy, thrown in at the deep end that afternoon had to follow in the footsteps left by John Bryant at the Southern supper. Not an easy task. Next year then, a long wait to Newark to see if the dynasty really has begun after a long wait of more than a century. MH

Blackheath Harriers changes its name to Blackheath Harriers Bromley.

"World famous Blackheath Harriers has started the new century by changing its name for the first time in 122 years. At Saturday's Annual General Meeting, the membership voted to rename the Club Blackheath Harriers Bromley.

The change is not revolutionary, but a recognition of the status quo, as the Club has been based in the Bromley area for 80 years, firstly from 1921 in West Wickham, and then from 1926 at Hayes. The Club was formed in 1869 as Peckham Hare And Hounds and changed it's name when it moved to Blackheath in 1878.

The 1990s proved to be the most successful decade in the Club's history with the Senior Men winning the National Cross Country and the National 12 Stage Relays for the first time; the Juniors seven times National Junior Athletic League champions; and eight National Young Athletes Finals won. Numerous athletes have gained international recognition with the highlight being Julian Golding's win in the 200 metres at the 1998 Commonwealth Games.

Despite this success, and the thousands of pounds raised for local charities by the Club's runners in the London Marathon, it has been clear that many in the local community do not know where the Club is situated.

With fewer youngsters involved in sport, and at a time when there are more sports to choose from, it is felt essential to act to consolidate its position as one of the Premier Clubs in the country. The change in the Club's name is intended to boost recruitment, by increasing its profile in the local community and forging stronger links with the local schools.

At the same time it recognises its roots, with the Blackheath Harriers name known throughout the country and the world, and various training bases in the South London area including Catford and Crystal Palace.

"This is a big step forward for the Club, and one which can only aid long term development" said outgoing President Richard Coles. The change was also welcomed by Coles successor, Mike Davies, who has recently given up his post as Athletics Development Officer for Kent. Davies has been involved in the sport for over 50 years as competitor and official and has previously been a member of Liverpool Harriers and Coventry Godiva Harriers. He has also played in the same basketball team as UK Athletics chief executive David Moorcroft.

Speaking of the year ahead, the new President used the initials of his name (M.J.D) to highlight one of the themes of his year in office. ""More Jobs Done" is what the Club needs," he stated referring to the shortage of officials, which is the problem facing all athletics clubs around the country."

Dave Heath is first Briton home in the short course race at the World Cross Country Championships in Vilamoura, Portugal. At the CGU International at Glasgow, Julian Golding is third in the 200 in 21.26. He also runs a split of 46.8 in the 4x400. Mark Steinle wins the Fleet Half Marathon in 64.39.



Helen Godsell wins the W50 60 and 200 metre titles at the European Masters Championships in Sweden. She also wins silver in the 400. Allan Williams wins silver in the M50 pole Vault and Jim Day takes bronze in the M70 pole vault. Earlier in the month at the Kent indoor championships Allan breaks the British M50 record with a clearance of 4.10. Scott Huggins breaks the Scottish Under 17 pole vault record with a clearance of 4.03.
